

PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

Thredbo's 60th Anniversary year ended with a rush – consistent with the very active program we had set for the Society to mark the Anniversary in 2017.

On Friday afternoon of 24th November we had gladly accepted an invitation from Kerry Coomber Manager NPWS Snowy Region Visitor Centre, to hold a film and book signing event at their auditorium. In welcoming the 30 plus audience to the centre, Kerry also introduced Tim Scanlon Resorts Liaison Officer, who has replaced the resigning Dave Wood who had established a strong and supportive relationship with the Society over many years. Author Chas Keys spoke and then attended to book signings followed by a pleasant afternoon tea in the adjacent Parc Café.

A week later we were hosted by Nan and Larry Adler at their Collaroy store for a similar event. Welcome drinks were followed by the Film "Charles Anton The Main Range and Thredbo 1950 – 1962" and Chas Keys giving an entertaining talk on the challenges faced by an author.

We would like to thank Kerry Coomber of NPWS for their ongoing support in promoting our book at their 4 visitor centres throughout the Snowy region. Similarly we again express our gratitude to Larry and Nan Adler and their staff who are promoting and selling our book in their 3 Sydney retail stores as well as one in Jindabyne.



Committee members elected are Chrissi Webb (Public Officer), Anne Collet (Membership Officer), Jerry Krejzar (Manager Oral Histories), Randy Wieman, Victoria Incani, Kerri Koczanowski, and Graeme Holloway who stepped down as Vice President.

We warmly welcome our two new committee members Victoria and Kerri. Marion Murri a committee member from the Society’s inception, announced that she was not seeking re-election and also Chas Skinner of Cooma did not seek re-election. We thank you both for your service. We should also mention here our appreciation of the service provided by outgoing Treasurer Caroline Simmons over the past 2 years.

Further into the newsletter you will find a cameo piece on Marion’s long association with the society and also short bios on our two new committee members and new Vice President.

The Annual General Meeting was followed by a convivial light lunch and our thanks go to Ed and Judy Denny.

MUSEUM VOLUNTEERS: The Museum Local Volunteer program initiated by Kosciusko Thredbo P/L has gained another two long time Thredbo locals, in Errol and Elsa Hanlon who join Michelle Palmer, Kellie Meehan, Brie Connor, Renee Connor and Victoria Incani, with Victoria, now on our committee, kindly agreeing to manage for us the recruitment and coordination of the local volunteer program.

Whilst on the subject of volunteers, member Chas Skinner of Cooma took the initiative to open the museum from the start of the school holidays on 16 Dec through to and including Christmas day. He gave the externals of the Museum a real attention grabbing Christmas look with some of his own personal collection. With the opening of the museum for these 10 days (normally closed then) we attracted over 500 visitors. Thank you Chas. This overall effort by our volunteers enabled us to open the Museum to the public everyday from the commencement of the school holidays to the 28 January, a total of 44 days attracting 1856 Visitors.

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MARION MURRI

After 21 years, Marion Murri has stepped down from the THS Committee. She attended the formation meeting in 1995, and was nominated to the position of Assistant Secretary at the inaugural Annual General Meeting in 1996. Her role developed into that of Social Secretary in 1999.

Since then Marion was involved in practically all the social activities of the Society, including a trip to the historic Buffalo Chalet, mid winter dinners, spring thaw dinners, lounge lizards gatherings, Snow Fall cocktails and historic ski days. She edited the earlier editions of the Society’s Newsletter and held the position of Public Officer from 2001 to 2003.

Marion is responsible for the development of the Society’s collection of snow sportswear. In 2010 she washed, sorted and itemised 186 garments into boxes ready for storage. She curated a very successful museum display in 2010 featuring the “Ski Fashions of the Decades”, sharing many items from her own collection. She was always prepared to step into the breach in manning the Museum should she be available. Marion also assisted at a number of working bees either in Thredbo or at a storage location.

It should also be mentioned that Marion was an enthusiastic supporter for the development of the successful Thredbo Masters’ ski race training program under the leadership of Tim Robertson.

The contribution by Marion to the development and functioning of Thredbo Historical Society was a major one and her input will be missed.

The old Thredbo Top Station Bell now has a home in the Alpine Museum. This old bell was originally attached to the wall on the outside of Top Station (around 1973). A very energetic ski patroller would go to the bell and flog it mercilessly with metal edge of the half (broken) ski kept near the bell for this daily ritual. The ceremonious peeling of the bell announced that the Basin lift was about to close and the last ride down Crackenback Chairlift was shortly commencing.

The bell was rescued by Ludwig Rabina when it was discarded and it is now donated to the Thredbo Alpine Museum by his daughters and grand children – Claire Rabina (now Groot) and daughter Evelyn, and Julia Rabina and her son Flynn- November 2017.

A HISTORY OF AVIOR SKI CLUB

In the early 1960's a group of RAAF officers from RAAF Base Richmond, NSW, would enjoy ski holidays in the NSW ski fields of Perisher Valley and Charlotte Pass. From their enjoyment came a desire to form a Ski Club and build a lodge in the NSW ski fields that would be owned by the members. Amongst many who contributed to the development of this idea one prominent figure was Flight Lieutenant Bill Cape, a Neptune pilot at No 11 Squadron.

With the opening of the chairlift from the Thredbo Valley to Charlotte Pass in the early 1960's a block of land was selected at Charlotte Pass and a deposit paid to start the process. The difficulties experienced by this chairlift in 1964/65 lead to the focus moving to Thredbo Village. A block of land was allocated above Bobuck Lane, a sublease signed, and a contract was let with Bela Racsko to build a lodge for \$28,000.00.

In parallel with these activities, members were recruited for an investment of \$400.00 each. A loan was obtained from the Bank of New South Wales. Some of the members contributed their own funds due to shortfalls in membership recruiting and payments. Members from the Sydney area travelled to Thredbo during the early months of 1968 to provide unskilled labour to assist with the building. The lodge in a very basic form opened for use on 27 July 1968. So the vision was on its way.

A Ski Lodge is something that is built to be modified, altered, changed, renovated, improved over its life and Avior Lodge is no exception. The original approval was for 18 beds in 8 bedrooms upstairs and this has remained unchanged but the size of the bedrooms has shrunk due to altered fire safety rules. The original bathrooms upstairs were extensively changed. The original kitchen was changed twice and the dining living area downstairs has seen major alterations and extensions over time which has allowed for unparalleled views of the Thredbo ski slopes.

The original wood burning fireplace remains and continues to smoke depending on the wind.

The stairs, entry and drying rooms are little changed. Externally the verandas have been increased in size and repaired several times. The original step ladder to the front door was soon replaced with masonry stairs from the car parking space which was considerably increased in size in 1977.

The original membership plan was for 60 members and this has remained unchanged over the years to ensure reasonable access for members in the relatively short Australian ski season. The club was established as a Co-Operative under the NSW Act and remains this way. The many improvements to the lodge have been funded by loans or overdrafts from the Bank of NSW or from the accumulated funds from members' use of the lodge, largely in winter. The original loan from members was turned into equity and more recently a yearly membership fee has been charged which now contributes a significant proportion of income.

The original sub lease from KT has been extended several times and now runs to 2057 with consequent changes in site rental and bed charges. These changes required careful and mature consideration over the years but always with the objective of ensuring the lodge remained operating at Thredbo. Of the original 60 members 13 remain as members. At the time of writing, the current membership was 38.

Until recent years Committee Membership (Directors) was made up of the original members or their mature aged replacements. In the past few years a number of children of original or replacement members have become members in their own right. Committee Membership is now largely made up of this new generation of skiers but several original members remain Committee members in their more mature years.


Despite the views of original members, snowboarding is now the sport of many who stay at Avior in the winter. With the passing of time guests at Avior now include a third generation of snow sports enthusiasts.

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A HISTORY OF AVIOR SKI CLUB *continued*

Many members, families and guests have used Avior as a holiday home in the mountains during the non-snow months as a base for hiking, and other forms of enjoying the facilities of the Thredbo Village and the Kosciuszko National Park. Mountain biking is now a significant activity for members, their children and guests. Members' working parties to repair or repaint the lodge and fill the wood room have been regular activities and have contributed to the sense of ownership of the lodge.

With the enthusiasm of current members, its history and its sound financial condition Avior should continue to be much loved and used for years to come. The initiator of Avior Ski Club and its lodge, Flight Lieutenant, later Qantas Captain, now *Mr Bill Cape retains his membership No 1 position and is now the Club's Patron. *Bill Collins, May 2017*

PATRICIA HECHER – A TRIBUTE

It was a fitting venue that the celebration of Tricia's life should be held at Bernti's Lodge in Thredbo on January 26th 2018, when the backbone of the Thredbo community gathered to pay tribute to her. Tributes covering different aspects of her life were given by Michelle Reichinger, Louise Gibson and Frank Prihoda.

Patricia Hecher nee Hogan, grew up in Melbourne. She began her career working as an accountant in the Taxation Office and one year Tricia was awarded the title of "Miss Accountancy". She fell in love with skiing and the charming Austrian ski instructor Bernti Hecher on a holiday at Falls Creek in 1970. After fun times spent between Stowe and Falls Creek ski resorts, where Bernti instructed and Trish worked in Montreal and Melbourne, the couple married in 1972.

Michelle Reichinger related her first impressions of Tricia: "It was Winter, 1972. An intriguing young woman walks into our store, long brown hair, false eyelashes, engaging smile and a leopard coat. Enter Tricia Hecher ... the attractive new wife of Austrian ski instructor Bernti Hecher and the beginning of a legendary Thredbo glamour couple....."

After a brief stint managing and catering at the Thredbo Alpine Club, Tricia's vision for "Bernti's" began to materialise. The year was 1978. *'Build it and they will come...'* And come they did. The well heeled flocked to the restaurant to see and be seen. The cuisine was par excellence and the ambience opulent and intimate.

What a coup for Thredbo and it's patrons. Stage 2 followed a couple of years later, in 1981, incorporating Bernti's Cafe, the penthouse, the guest lounge, staff quarters and more guest accommodation.

All the important occasions were celebrated at Bernti's, many significant birthdays including Heinz's 50th Tyrolian themed birthday, my 50th that was photo bombed by Nick Greiner, the then premier of NSW. The wedding of Thredbo locals Tim and Gabi Robertson and the recognition dinner in honour of Dick Düsseldorp's contribution to the development of Thredbo resort plus all manner of conferences and lavish cocktail parties.

Tricia was a force of nature, generous, passionate, driven, flirtatious, creative, egalitarian,

ambitious, smart and a little mysterious. Life at Bernti's was a roller coaster but never dull.

In between two babies were born, Tina and Tash, adding to the Thredbo's growing population. Family holidays were shared in Sun Valley, Kitzbuhel, St Anton, Gerlos, India and Kashmir, and Thredbo get-togethers were frequent.

The Thredbo disaster (1997) and it's affects on the family business marked a turning point in the fortunes of Bernti's. Tricia was not adverse in taking on the NSW government, the NPWS, the big banks and the Resort operators in achieving an equitable outcome, eventually with considerable success.

After the fall out from this tumultuous time Tricia moved to Sydney with the family. There she cared for Bernti after suffering a stroke post the Thredbo disaster. This was undertaken with great love and affection until Bernti died some 10 years later. Prior to this Bernti was recognised as Thredbo's number one ski instructor.

Soon after Tricia together with her daughters Natasha and Christina, moved back to Tyrol, Bernti's birthplace. In recent years Tricia reinvented herself, buying and operating a boutique pension near St Anton, where she entertained many a Thredbo guest with her characteristic flair and generosity. Her two Austrian grandchildren, Allegra and Raphael gave her much pleasure in her later years.

The landmark building, "Bernti's" stands as a legacy to the brainchild of a very talented and accomplished wife, Tricia Hecher and her husband, builder Bernti Hecher."

Louise Gibson then spoke of her time working for Tricia from 1984 to 1994. "Tricia and I made a great team, I was the phone person on reception, doing bookings etc which enable Tricia to get on with what she loved the most – research on all things current! Tricia was up with all the tricks of the trade, and she was well read on business and marketing, and she implemented tools so the lodge would be humming with a high occupancy in summer and winter along with a buzzing bar and restaurant.

The Chamber of Commerce became an important project for Tricia and she was vigorous with the available resources to help Thredbo on the map especially in summer. The photo shoots of picnicking by the river and hiking to Kosciuszko were all choreographed by Tricia.

Tricia had a natural talent for good food and wine and the restaurant was considered for many years as the 'go to' place. She had created a room of elegance with delightful bonhomie and a menu to suit. Tricia's Tirolean decorations and individual pieces were carried back in our bags from skiing, to adorn the walls and add to the warmth of Bernti's.

Together with her daughters, Bernti's was Tricia's greatest achievement and although at times, unconventional, she and Bernti ably captained their ship, making many friends and happy memories along the way. I learnt a great deal from Tricia Hecher ... and although the words: tenacious and formidable come to mind, so does generous, kind and an unwavering pursuit of excellence for not only her business but of herself.

Thank you Tricia for your contribution to the Thredbo community and leaving us your legacy of Bernti's that you built, and its integral place in the wonderful mesh of Thredbo."

Thredbo identity Frank Prihoda who at 96 ½ years of age and Australia's oldest living Olympian – both summer and winter - spoke about Tricia and the times, saying that he had honour and privilege to be her friend. He said "I have known Tricia since, I think it was 1976 and during that time we became friends. I appreciated the excellent work she and Bernti have done in creating the fine hotel with its excellent dining room where I loved to go and enjoy the hospitality and outstanding cuisine of the this excellent establishment. Tricia was very caring for her friends, customers, staff, creative and entertaining, at the same time being an enterprising business woman and fine lady - an almost miraculous person.

The friendship continued even after her and Bernti's leaving Thredbo and living in Sydney. After Tricia has settled in Austria in the St.Anton area, the active friendship was renewed through my visits to Europe and doing several trips with her friend Rosa, and mine, through Austria, Switzerland, Germany and the Czech Republic. They were the times I shall always cherish in my memories. The world lost an outstanding person.

Tricia's sudden death on January 12th 2018, is mourned by her daughters, grandchildren, extended family and her friends. Today "Bernti's" is still a special place in Thredbo and it remains as a symbol to what Tricia and Bernti achieved.
